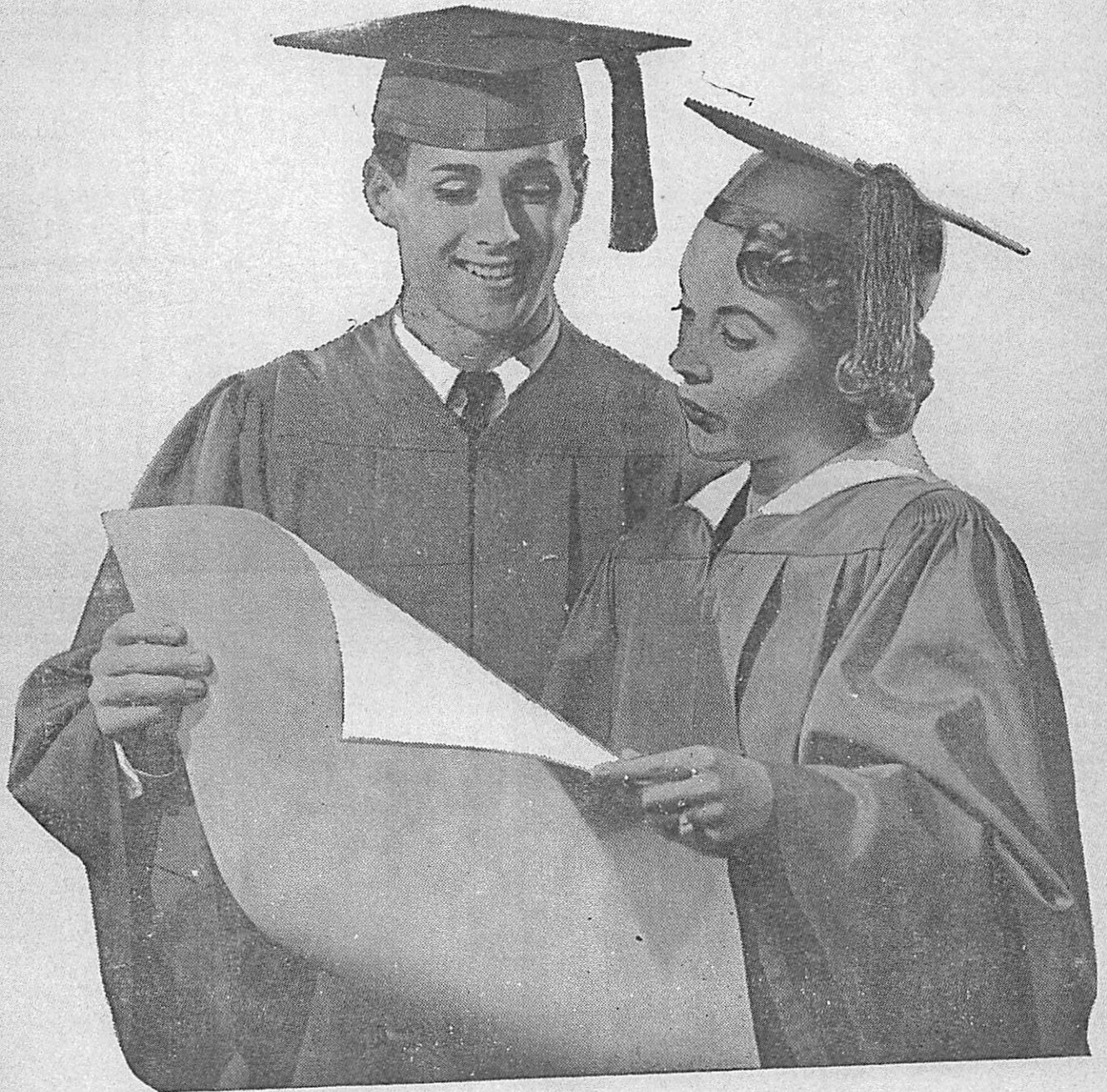

Wachholtz Vaults To Height of 12-5 1/2

Three out of eleven of the NPHS thincad placed in the Nebraska State Track and Field meet held in Memorial Stadium in Lincoln on May 17 and 18. Competition was rough as many records were broken and made. A throng of 8,000 cheered as 17 records fell and three were equalled.

Larry Wachholtz tied for first in Class A height but only qualified as second because of more misses. And his 12-5 1/2 was good enough for a third in the all class height since he was bettered by Ron Fecht of Gothenburg, and Jack Ehler of Scottsbluff who had a 12-5 1/2 mark but fewer misses.

Dale Chase cleared the bar at 6-1/2 to tie down a third place and receive state honors. Jack Edwards qualified in the preliminaries as a strong third in the 120 high hurdles but failed to place in the finals. Jack also ran in the 180 "lows" and placed third in his heat, but did not have a qualifying time so as to get into the finals. And Bob Thomas placed third in one weight event to conclude our three State qualifiers. Thomas heaved the shot 53-6 which was good for a third in Class A competition but was a fourth among the All Class competitors.

Platter District qualifiers that did not place at state were Pete Nielsen - discus, Denny Yost - 880 yard run, Pete Tatman - low and high hurdles, Jim Mick, Rodney Tuenge, Bill Brown, and Jack Edwards - 880 yard relay.

Compared with last year's team which slipped into the Top Ten by clinching the ninth peg with 8 and 3/4 points, the Platter Thincad racked up 1 1/4 points more to place ninth, in one of Nebraska's histories hardest cinder meet.

This was accomplished by Wachholtz bettering last year's mark of 12-4 which was good enough for third and fourth. Improvement by Thomas who established better marks than last year's mark of 50-5 for sixth in the shot, helped them along the way as did Dale Chase's third that bettered Dick McWilliam's 5-9 3/4 that was good for last year's fifth.

All in all these higher qualifying positions show great improvement but not enough to get top honors and win the first State Track Meet in NPHS history, so we as students of NPHS can look forward to seeing a possible State Track and Field Championship come to NPHS.

Netsters Thumped Hard In First Round

North Platte Tennis Club was served its first defeat of the year in the State Tennis Championship. The Bulldog netsters carried a 5-0 record to state but suffered their first defeat in their first competition in the preliminaries.

Mike Kirkman lost to Rich Young of Omaha Westside by the score of 6-8, 6-3, and 8-6. And the combination of Henry Cox-Bob Gibson of Lincoln South East

outplayed the Platter combination of Lowell Harvey - Jim Huffman to the sad tune of 6-1 and 7-5. Thus North Platte failed to score or get by the first round.

The inexperienced Bulldog Golf Club paced by Denny Young, Don Detlefson, and Dick Fontane placed twenty-first with 261 points in State competition. Young had scores of 46-42 for a circuit total of 88. Detlefson turned in scores of 51-40 for a total of 91 while his teammate, Dick Fontane, scored 43-39 for a total of 82. This years result is a drop of eleven places since a well experienced link squad of last year placed tenth.

The most needed element lack-

ing was experience that would have sent this team to a higher peg in state competition.

NP Clinches First Title In 41 Years

As we look back on "62" and "63" we can remember one State Championship, two Big Tens, one District Championship and the action that brought this string of four trophies for NPHS. Redding's roudies scraped their way to a State Championship, and a Big Ten, while Roth's netsters bounced to the other Big Ten, and Folsom'n bubble bouncers grabbed the Disteict Championship.

Football

NPHS gldsters posted nine consecutive wins for "62" and twelve straight over a two year period. These crappy Bulldogs brought prestige with a State Championship, our first in 41 years, and our second straight Big Ten. Both championships were achieved in one game by out-fighting the Hastings Tigers, 13-12. Recall to your memory these plays. Wachholtz heaved two touchdown passes to Thomas and Rodger Tuenge respectively while Tatman added the extra point. Decisive defensive plays were tailored to the time by Rodger and Rodney Tuenge, Alan Whitesel, and Mike Kirkman. Rodney pulled down Weber after a killoff return to end a 56 yard jaunt that could have meant a fatal blow while later Kirkman stopped a Tiger drive inside our ten with a seven yard loss. Whitesel blosked the point after an attempt that could have spelled defeat or tie, and Rodger intercepted a Weber pass and scampered 68 yards to the Tiger's twelve to end another Tiger drive and put it out of reach.

Basketball

The Bulldogs had a desire to win that increased toward the end and displayed an honorable record of 13-6. Folsom's five defeated Lexington and a weary McCook to win a state berth and take divisional honors. Bob Thomas, who led in district scoring with 25 tallies, engineered a three-point play to squeeze past Lexington 51-46. Wachholtz saved the day for us by completing a fast

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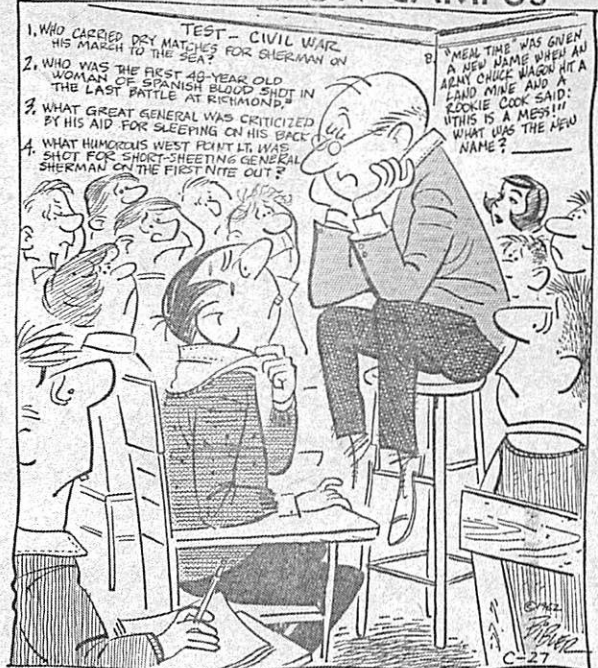
